In January 2010, USPG Mission Companions Jane and Martin Canning from Bristol went to work with the Anglican Church in Tanzania (ACT). Martin was appointed Business Development Consultant to work alongside the church to help implement ACT's strategic five-year plan. Martin is using his business experience to facilitate and set up income generating projects to support the growing number of dioceses within Tanzania and help the church to become self-sufficient. Jane is working as a Senior Lecturer at St John's University in Dodoma, in the nursing, pharmacy and education faculties.

The university was founded three years ago by the Anglican Church with the motto 'To learn and serve'. The University Chancellor, the Rt Revd Mtetemela explained: 'Starting a university is a crucial enterprise for the future of our nation and our people. It is a historic initiative by our church for the benefit of all Tanzanians, regardless of race, colour, tribe or gender and religious or political affiliation.' ACT's work which the Cannings are supporting through their time and skills is helping to address the long-term needs of Tanzania.
